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dyslexia in many languages thoroughly investigates the fascinating relationship between dyslexia and language systems by highlighting research and practice initiatives around the world focusing on how dyslexia manifests itself in non english languages readers of this text will enhance their understanding and appreciation for the role of language systems and the interplay they have with dyslexia assessment and intervention experienced and expert contributors around the world consider how dyslexia is defined assessed and supported in their native country drawing on the linguistic features of that language and how this affects monolingual bilingual and multilingual speakers this book also compares dyslexia in different languages and questions what are the universal lessons that we can learn from comparing dyslexia in different languages and do different languages affect its prevalence and incidence the editors consider the implications for classroom practice such as learning and teaching challenges the social emotional and educational impact on the child as a learner and considers the various sides of the educational process of students with dyslexia in different languages this volume is essential reading for teachers and psychologists who deal with a large number of students and patients coming from different language backgrounds researchers and educators interested in dyslexia in different languages will also find its contents useful and relevant in their learning and work contexts

this book provides rare insights into motivation among extremely successful learners of english and languages other than english lotes through the analysis of a longitudinal study and the examination of the factors involved in becoming multilingual in a non multilingual environment based on sixteen interview sessions conducted over the course of nine years while the

learners progressed from high school to the world of work this book offers the story of how two learners persist in English L2 learning the study illuminates the long term processes through which the interviewees develop ideal English L2 selves in an environment where multilingualism is not emphasized and where both English and L2s can still be described as foreign languages educators and researchers will learn from this study which stretches our understanding of motivation beyond the recent theorizing of L2 motivation and contributes to the limited research in long term motivational trajectories and L2 learning motivation which is particularly scarce in non-European contexts the book will be of interest not only to readers in Japan but also to those in other contexts as it offers an example of successful learners who go beyond the pragmatic and instrumentalist view of language learning to hold a more holistic view thus revealing the factors which can sustain multiple language learning even in foreign language contexts

in the global economy linguistic diversity influences economic and political development as well as public policies in positive and negative ways it leads to financial costs communication barriers divisions in national unity and in some extreme cases conflicts and war but it also produces benefits related to group and individual identity what are the specific advantages and disadvantages of linguistic diversity and how does it influence social and economic progress this book examines linguistic diversity as a global social phenomenon and considers what degree of linguistic variety might result in the greatest economic good Victor Ginsburgh and Shlomo Weber look at linguistic proximity between groups and between languages they describe and use simple economic linguistic and statistical tools to measure diversity's impact on growth development trade the quality of institutions translation issues voting patterns in multinational competitions and the likelihood and intensity of civil conflicts they address the choosing of core languages in a multilingual community such as the European Union and argue that although too many official languages might harm cohesiveness efficiency and communication reducing their number brings about alienation and disenfranchisement of groups demonstrating that the value and drawbacks of linguistic diversity are universal how many languages do we need suggests ways for designing appropriate linguistic policies for today's multilingual world
